

#### What is the Ashmere Project?

The Ashmere Project is an organization that provides residential retreats and programming for adults with and without disabilities. Our mission is to nurture a community of friends who create art; celebrate diversity; and foster inclusion, independence and equity.

Our community is made up of some new comers and largely long-time friends who spent many years together attending a camp on Martha's Vineyard. In Fall of 2021, we decided to branch off and start something new. In the summer of 2022, we hosted our first retreat.

Each summer, we gather as a loving community on Lake Ashmere in the Berkshires for two weeks of fun and collaboratie creativity. We swim in the lake, do classes around our site, visit museums, get out in nature, play, make music, create art, have new experiences, and write and perform an original musical at Williams College.

It is expected that everyone, disabled or not, participates in their own way and supports one another. Volunteers are paired up one-on-one with someone with a disability and assist with activities of daily living, including providing accommodations, promoting independence, ensuring safety, and cultivating fun!

The Ashmere Project runs 100% on donations. No one pays or gets paid to attend. The retreat's cost is completely covered by the generosity of our donors and in-kind gifts.
